# THE WRONG ONE?

I was asked to express a balanced view of Manchester United and David Moyes, to which I said yes. But then I started wondering – would I ever be able to do a ‘balanced’ piece on Moyes? At the risk of sounding extremely opinionated, here it goes.

Let's start from way back, before Moyes was appointed and before Sir Alex announced his retirement. Was Manchester United prepared for it at that point? I understand the argument that the club had absolute trust in Sir Alex's judgment. But if we listen to what Moyes had to say about his appointment, we see a different picture. One where the club ‘gave’ the role to Moyes without giving him a chance to decline it, without giving him a chance to explain what his vision and action plan was. Don't believe me? Moyes said “I got the call from Sir Alex when I was out with Pamela, shopping. I was in jeans and T-shirt. I had never met Sir Alex like that.” He went on, “I am retiring at the end of the season and you are the next manager of Manchester United”.

So we did not ask Moyes for what his vision for “Moyes’ Man United” was. Nor did we give him a chance to decline the job. Not that I am convinced he would decline it.

Everton fans had a nickname for Moyes – Dithering Dave – because of his delays in closing transfers and his second-guessing of himself. Add to that a completely new man at the helm in Ed Woodward, Moyes did not have the best of transfer windows. I, like you, have read versions of our first transfer window. But there was one thing that was common to all our deals – we looked strangely out of our comfort zone. This is the same club that signed up Javier Hernandez before even scouts got wind of the player himself. This marks the second mistake - letting Sir Alex and David Gill go together. This meant the continuity was gone. I have not heard about a third party negotiating a transfer for United. Neither have I seen us looking so out of ideas in the transfer market. That was years and years of the Gill-Fergie team - one of whom should have stayed and helped the replacement. Fergie working with Ed for a season or David Gill working a season with Moyes – that is how it should have been. Thiago, Herrera, Kroos, Riberio, Fabregas, Baines, and finally Fellaini who was signed for 5 million pounds more than his release clause, of which Moyes of all people should have been aware. I don't blame Moyes for the Fellaini saga as it would have been a PR disaster if we went his first window without a signing.

So, Dave dithered.



Remember when we talked about continuity? Apart from Chris Woods, who has looked their part in the Moyes' backroom staff? It is my opinion that one of our key backroom staff should have been retained in an official capacity to have some sort of continuity, Rene is an established figure, a well-known trainer and has been with us for a long time. Retaining him should have been a high priority. Some of our players didn't react well to the new training methods, a transition which should have been smoother.

Now we come to our players – I am still in complete awe of how some players have reacted and behaved during this whole saga. I am not going to take names here, but you know who they are. You don't play for Sir Alex or David Moyes. You play for the shirt. It feels like some of us forgot that part and decided to voice their frustrations in very un-United ways.

At the beginning of the season, what were your expectations? Mine was top four, while playing some good football; a decent run in Europe and that was it. I will bet good money that most of you thought the same. Apart from some individuals playing good football in patches; we failed to achieve the first two objectives. The thing that annoyed me to the core was our inability to find something close to a starting 11. I wasn't expecting David Moyes to have his 11 sorted out from day one, but we have fielded a unique team in EVERY Premier League game that we have played this season. No United 11 played two games this season – think about that for a moment and compare with the other clubs. We had a decent run in Europe. We did well in games we were not supposed to, we had results and we played right. It's almost as if we played well when we were underdogs or when we were written out.

From his interviews and clips from Carrington, I've come to the conclusion that David Moyes was an honest man, but an honest man can't manage a club like United.

At the risk of inviting your collective wrath, he almost sounded like Roy Hodgson at Liverpool at couple of times. Aspiring to be at the level of City? Liverpool have an advantage? Liverpool are favorites? Even if we are 17th in the league and playing Liverpool at Anfield, that's not what I want my manager to say. Not that he was wrong, but you cannot be a Man United manager and say things like that.

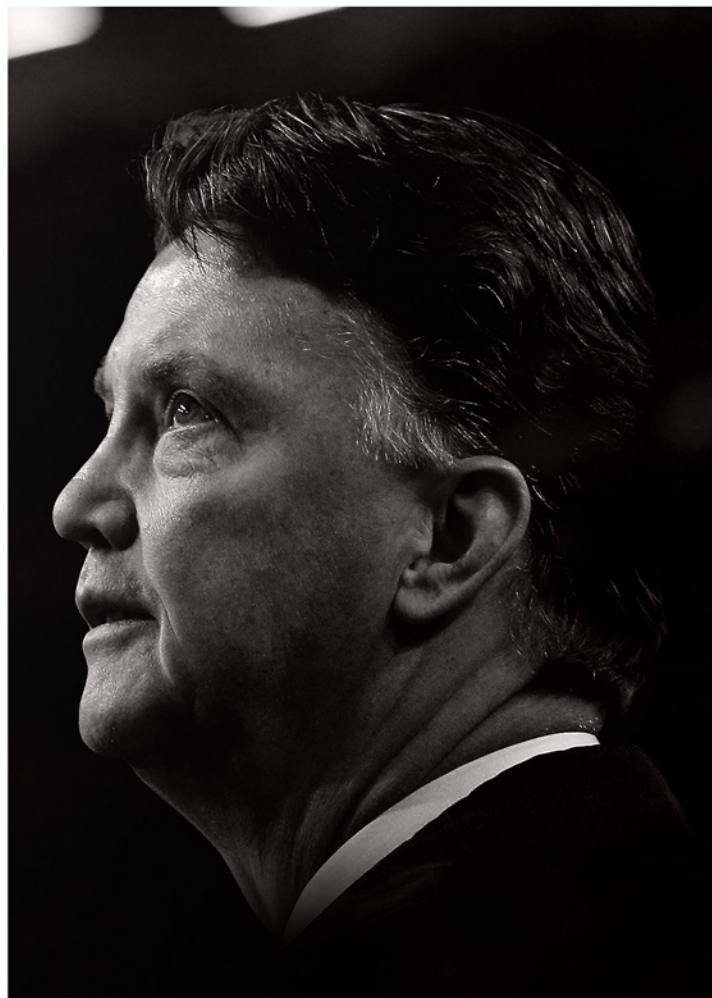




So, was it all bad? Sadly, most of it was. But we are not without a few silver linings. Adnan Januzaj. I would always be thankful to David Moyes for not making another Pogba out of Adnan. As someone who follows the U21, I had not been this excited about one of our kids since Rossi. Moyes not only signed him up for the long term, he gave Adnan chances and boy, didn't he use them. Juan Mata – when a player of Mata's calibre becomes available, you sign him and then think of how to play with Mata in the team. Moyes did that. Now, I feel pretty miserable writing the next part but it was always going to be difficult following Sir Alex Ferguson. Whoever comes next (Louis van Gaal was confirmed the day before this article was written) has to follow David Moyes. The expectations are much lower, the pressure is much less, and the fact that there needs to be a considerable investment to rebuild is out in the open and official. The fact that a nice man cannot manage United is now clear to the generation who grew up after Sir Alex's initial years. The fact that we have cleared up a lot of wages for new signings, the fact that we have some bright young lads coming from the academy...

I won't blame one party for the season we had. As a club, we failed. We failed to prepare for the inevitable management change from Sir Alex, we failed with our messages, and we failed with our transfers. It was not one man's failure. It was a collective.

Personal Note: As someone with fond memories of van Gaal's Ajax, we are in for a treat. There are not many managers who are trainers too. There are not many who have a philosophy and would put that before stars and names. Prepare for some of the best U21 football, a seamless transition path from junior squads to senior squads, an academy that plays the same football as the senior team and has the same philosophy.

# “TO BUILD A HOME”

Ours has been a journey. A long and ever changing one. A bit ironic when you compare it to United's stability. But we have finally found our place, our home, just like when United signed Sir Alex. And we intend to be here.

MUFCM was born on a rainy mushy evening in July 2006, when the waves were crashing into the boulders by Marine Drive, a few of the United fans decided to meet during the pre-season. The state of our club somehow matched the weather in Bombay. Manchester United were heading into oblivion. Three years had passed since we last won the league. We failed to reach the knock-outs of the Champions League for the first time since 93-94, Keane had left, Ruud was about to, Ronaldo was just a one-trick pony and Abramovich was treating Chelsea like a rich kid in a candy store.

As Srikanth Kannan reminisces, "There was a time towards the end of the meeting when we were discussing signings. We were heavily linked with Marcos Senna and Michael Carrick. I said, jokingly, 'Of course we're going to win the league' and everyone smiled because it really did seem impossible. (Chelsea had signed Ballack and Sheva)

Fast-forward to end of 2006-07, CHAMPIONS!"

26th August 2006. The baby about to get up and walk for the first time. He might tumble and get few bruises but one fine day, he will learn to walk. Looking back at Hotel Yogi, where our first get-together was organised, the venue was far from perfect. In fact imagine the most ordinary place with ordinary walls, and ordinary chairs with an ordinary television showing ordinary pictures. Done imagining it?

To add salt to the wound only 7 supporters turned up. It was that sort of day. Our bruises. Even the pitch at Watford was really ordinary (and dodgy). But we still won. And we managed to diminish our tumbles. Leaving all that behind, we, a supporter's club 4500 miles away, met and somehow organised a screening in a city with nothing in common with Manchester apart from its first letter. It wasn't a meeting of 7 friends. It was 7 strangers connected by similar passion, meeting to watch football together. The significance of that waiting to be unleashed.

As Chembur wasn't that easily accessible by the people from western suburbs and south Mumbai, plus we weren't big fans of that hotel, plus we were trying to find a new place where we aren't bound by the rules and that which falls in the middle, we foolishly went to Sports Bar Express in Colaba. Loud Music. No commentary. Difficulty in finding tables. Basically a normal pub covered by the blanket of sports. Needless to say it wasn't a good experience and off we went to the thinking tables, scouting for new places.



One of us finally found it. It was our place, our Mecca, a place that we could call home for years to come, a hotel in Dadar that goes by the name of Avon Ruby. Our stepping stone. The time when the toddler is no more a toddler, but a boy after puberty, shaping his future. It was there we grew from a meagre 7, to a quarter of a century. We have had our good days and our off days. There was a match against Spurs where we literally were just 9 of us, but we also had times when we had to deny entry, one of them against Barca when we got over-packed. From seats being booked for the regulars to shouting for starters to come, from handing out printed papers that had chants on it, to hearing us out performing the speakers, from trying to push for official recognition to finally forming an 'un'official fan club, we had seen it all. We had our differences, our arguments. Some wanted the rivals to join in, others didn't. We had the fans moaning as the screen loved to turn itself off during the crucial moments of the match, but we also celebrated the joy of getting our trophy back after 3 dreadful years. Somehow Avon Ruby was like Man United. Full of drama, passion, and never giving up till the end.

Nandan, one of the oldies recollecting, "Myself, Srikanth & few others had developed this Superstition of sitting in the Top Left Hand Side of the room. I do remember praying like a mad fucker (which does not happen too often), when 90mins was approaching that - Just win, Anyhow."



But as all good times come to an end, our time at Avon was up. The owners were asking for too much money and we didn't want to be another Cafe. We were here for the fans, not to fool them and charge them exorbitant rates. After winning 4 League Titles and the Champions League, time had come to shut the shop after five glorious years and search for a new place.

Irish Pub at Khar became our venue. No more sitting down. Our time had come. Our numbers grew more than ever, even though on the other end, the Cafe was trying to get us divided. Not only the place got over-booked every match we screened, but now a wider part of the supporters started singing the chants. We had a turbulent season and naive as we were back then, we blamed the venue for our losses. Even though City won the title that year, we had a plethora of good memories. Off the top of my head, I remember couple of them, that I hold the dearest. The results were different, but unique in their own way. First when the Rooney scandal came out, that weekend we had to play City at Old Trafford. Naturally the rival fans came to our screening to humiliate us even more. But the same match Rooney scored the goal of the decade (Premier League). Needless to say we went wild. Our celebrations knew no bounds. Not only did we silence the rivals but it was one of those moments when the ceiling came crashing in, literally.





The other match again was against City. We suffered a mortifying loss. 6-1. But none of us left. We sang more than we ever had before. We stood for our team. Irish Pub was filled with echoes of 'We'll Never Die...Cos Manutd Will Never Die'. That moment was special. It spoke a lot. It made us United. It made us feel like a family, the great United family.

Overheard conversation that night: "We will be back, we'll remember this loss, but we'll be back as we always have."

And to make it even more special we got officially recognised by Manchester United. We were no longer just a fan club. We became the Official Supporters Club with the same ethos but in the process gaining the recognition that we deserved. Every screening we have organised at 3WM (barring a few), our numbers have kept on rising. From empty chairs at Yogi and Avon to find a breathing space at 3WM, from silent echoes of commentary to numbing ears and sore throats in the morning, from a family that started with seven of us to nearly seven thousand of us, that's how far we have come.

Again due to some issues that couldn't be sorted out, we had to find a new place. We did it fairly quickly, because we had a stabilised working committee. Sir Alex has taught us, stabilise your foundations and then come what may, we won't be broken. We'll be ready to face any adversity, no matter how challenging it seems.

Finally on March 11, 2013. The President of MUSCM, Sunil Thakur bought his own pub, Three Wise Monkeys and we MUSCM got a place that no longer was a rented home, but which we could rightfully call ours.

And thus started a new chapter in our journey. It coincided with Sir Alex retiring, and a new era that began at our club. The hardest time in any living United supporters' history. Or at least us who had never seen United without Ferguson. Granted we had our bad times last season. Worst, some may say. But isn't that what United is all about? Granted its over-used and a clichéd statement but I'm going to use it anyway. 'Rising from the Ashes'.

Oh I almost forgot to mention - I was hosting! I had never really done it before, but there I was, a nervous guy with fairly decent amount of homework and a



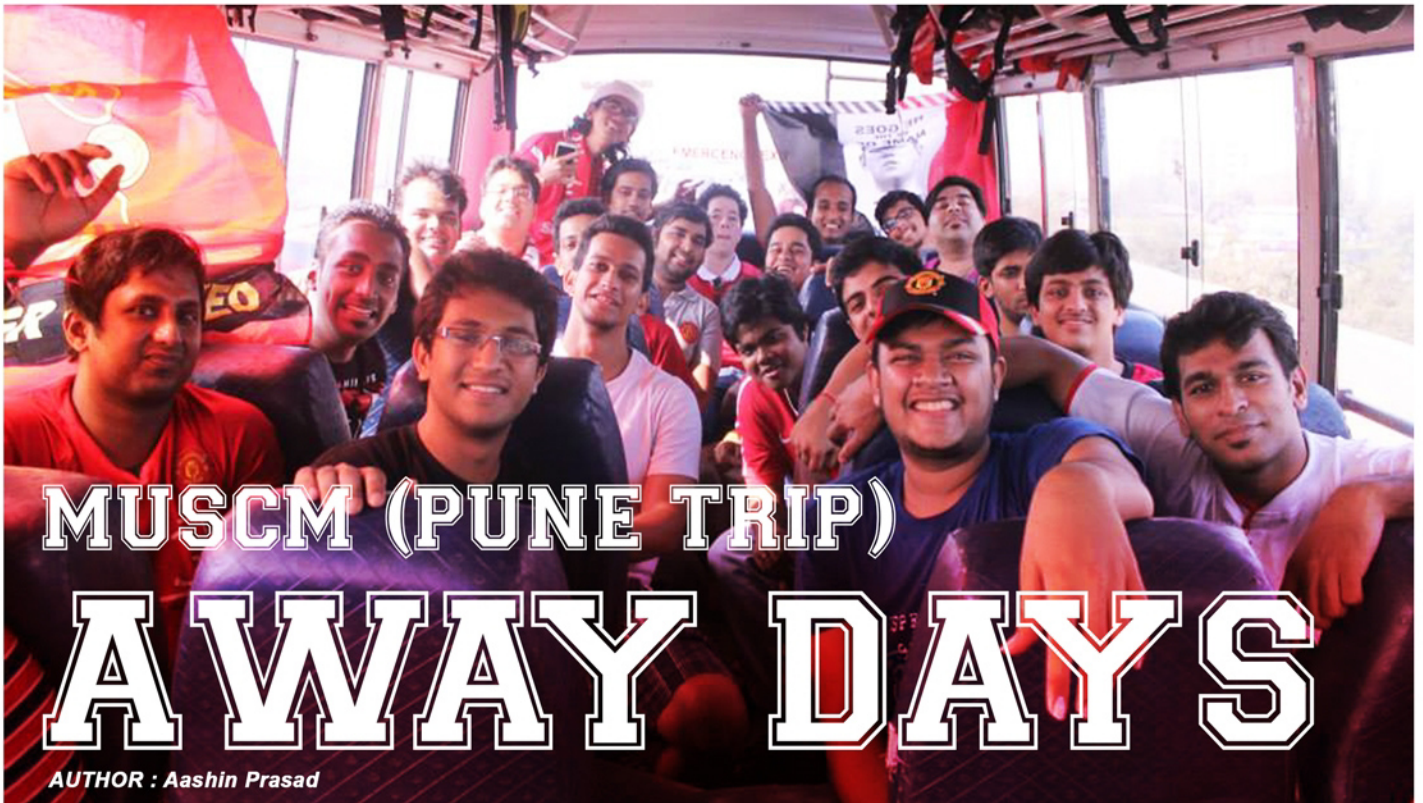

I met a fellow Man United supporter from Moscow Reds and we spoke about David Moyes and our new manager Louis van Gaal before meeting our other team-mates from Malaysia and China. We then met the majority of our team - The Official Manchester United Supporters Football Club i.e. the team that plays all the games representing Manchester United fans. The grass was immaculately cut, you could stand there admiring the place all day long. After a quick warm-up and passing the ball around, we lined-up in the tunnel for the kick-off.

After both teams were ready, the referee walked-us out just as in any professional game. Instead of the usual Rocky Fanfare, the Champions League anthem blared out of the speakers as the teams made their way to the centre. After a quick round of handshakes and pictures, it was time for kick-off as I assumed my position on the bench. Finally, Alan Keegan announced it and I wasn't sure I heard it right – The King Denis Law!! That was the absolute icing on the cake!

Denis spoke like a true gent. You could see he really didn't realize that he was such a larger-than-life character for so many fans around the world. He spoke about how playing at Old Trafford for the fans was special for any British footballer and the philosophy of playing attractive football for the fans. The mic went around for questions and 'THAT' goal against United came up. Denis Law had 'quite possibly' scored a goal for City against United at Old Trafford relegating us in 1973-74. Needless to say he was extremely apologetic about it and iterated the fact that he was heartbroken and retired from professional football the moment the ball went in. He said, if he could, he would erase the back-heel completely from his playing days. Legend!

I asked Denis if he received the hair-dryer treatment from Sir Matt Busby and he replied saying "All the time" because he was a bit all over the place on the pitch. Everyone then queued-up to receive match-day medals from The King and we were also allowed to talk to him and get pictures. t

I spoke to him specifically about our city and the support here. Absolute gentleman that he is...he was extremely apologetic about not coming to India or Mumbai and his message was "I'm sorry I've never been to Mumbai...Thanks for your support". I was a bit stunned if I'm being honest, what do you really say to a great man after that? We joked about cricket for a bit and he told me he'd liked my question about Sir Matt from earlier!

That was it. On the taxi ride back, my first misplaced pass and the view of each of the stands, the Stretford End, the bench, the East Stand from the pitch was all that I could think of. Why didn't I pass that ball further forward? Why didn't I send that clearance into Sir Alex Ferguson stand...I should've stayed-on for longer, after all it was a friendly game. Genuinely felt like a kid again.

Next morning, I logged-onto facebook and read the wishes from my friends back home and people from MUSCM. I felt extremely thankful to the MUSCM team...my team. Since I've quit MUSCM as a working member, the younger lads have taken up the mantle and lead the fan club quite superbly. I know I tweeted that Chevrolet fulfilled my dream because it was Chevrolet's event. But in reality, it was fulfilled by the MUSCM. Thank you guys! Each of you are as deserving to run out on that pitch as I am. Legends!

I will be telling my grandkids about the time I ran onto the pitch at Old Trafford.

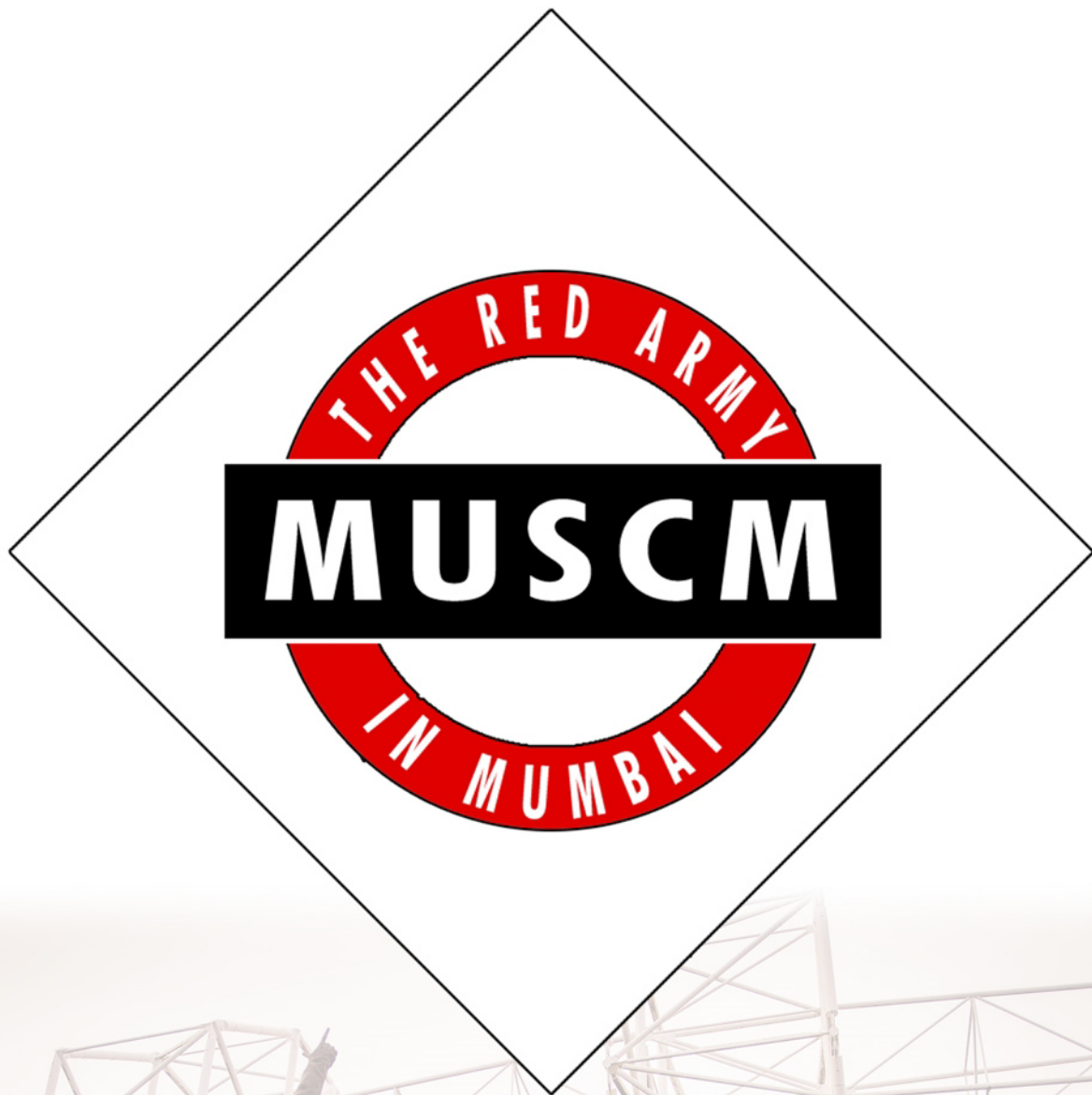
